



HARRY CHAPIN

REMEMBERING HARRY

"in short measures life may perfect be."

-Ben Jonson

What was it about Harry Chapin that made us feel his passing so deeply? I can only answer subjectively, but believe that my reaction was like that of many.

My family was cheerfully packing for a camping vacation when the news came. Throughout the days that followed, the quiet lakes and the refuge of lovely mountains were never enough to keep out the ache. It surprised me: first the tears, then the sense of deep loss we all felt. Even our 5-year-old, who was thrilled last February at his first Chapin concert, wept. I never imagined that the death of a popular singer could leave me feeling bereft of a dear friend.

But of course, he was so much more than another singer. First there was his charm. I found Harry instantly lovable, from his unruly curls down to his sneakers. They boyish grin always radiated abundant warmth. And I found, in my one personal encounter with the man (when I impulsively collared him to sit whilst I cut his silhouette at the Lively Arts Festival last year, just five minutes before his scheduled concert) that he was also a disarmingly down-to-earth unpretentious person. This sincerity, combined with a kind of magnetic energy he had, drew audiences and supporters alike.

Next there was the impact of his songs. Harry's music was very special and became a permanent part of me. Plato wrote, "music and rhythm find their way into the secret places of the soul." Not before that week in the mountains did I realize how much Harry's music had touched my life.

The "story songs," which "Taxi" typifies, stay with me as do particularly good novels I've read. But I've been more moved by the lyrics which revealed Harry himself. Here was man with unusual sensitivity about human relationships who candidly shared his insights. Through "Sandy" and "Poor Damned Fool," for instance, I glimpsed him as a husband. "Tangled Up

Puppet" and "Dancing Boy" let me share the joys and doubts of parenthood with Harry. His philosophy came through in songs like "Dreams Go By." His indictment of our sexist society in "The Little Girls Grew Up Crooked" and "Dirt Gets Under the Fingernails" added tremendously to my admiration. His understanding astonished me. As a former teacher, I applauded Harry's ideas on education and his satirical attack on a stifling educational viewpoint in "Flower Are Red." I could go on.

It is small wonder after years of Chapin recordings filling my home that I felt he had become a friend, a kindred spirit -- not matter that I was one of a million anonymous fans. I treasured his music more after hearing his concerts, for Harry always communicated a contagious joy on stage. He had a good time and the audience felt the same.

And yet the music was only one facet of the man. There was also Harry the philanthropist and Harry the lover and promoter of the arts. As an artist I appreciated and respected his work enormously. It was reassuring to know that someone with spunk and perserverance was accomplishing something vital like keeping PAF Playhouse alive, if I didn't have time to. In his commitment to the less fortunate, particularly the world's hungry, he was a paragon of what most religions hold up as the ideal. He lived out his convictions. The caring was never abstract; it was translated into action as energetic as Harry himself.

His concert schedule, illustrates Harry's popularity with fans everywhere, and all Long Island honored him at Hofstra on August 11: But we in Huntington held a special fondness for him. We didn't need to live on Locust Lane to feel that we were neighbors; Harry was everywhere: packing 'em in at the High School (yes, another benefit), entertaining at the fellowship or nursery school, holding fund-raisers for the public in his own home, signing autographs on tote bags, giving pointers to young guitarists, exhorting us to dig deeper for PAF. community causes, world-wide causes ... the list goes on. Harry just gave and gave, with little thought to personal gain. In this materialistic and pessimistic age he stood for values we seldom see in action. He was ours. And we were proud. He praised Huntington as "extraordinary" though he was the most extraordinary embodiment of its

Damned Fool," for instance, I glimpsed Now he's gone. But I believe it's him as a husband. "Tangled Up critical to realize how much he has left

to give! His music will live, of course, but even more important are the challenges he left us. The necessary processes of change he stood for have to go on. He made me a little more confident that I too can pick up a thread of that challenge and weave a little part of a better social fabric -- no matter how my talents may compare with his. Harry believed all of us have something to contribute and he proved how great a difference one person can make -- even in a too-brief span of years. I, for one, am inspired -- and grateful.



Relationships are the foundation of personal satisfaction of one kind or another and are necessary for our

growth and happiness.

There are many various kinds of relationships to experience in this life. Each offers its own demands and rewards. For example, mutual attachment is characteristic of the ideal relationship mother baby, since the helpless little one could not survive without the love and nuturing of the mother. Both mother and baby feel upset when separated and feel good when they are close as they are very sensitive to each other's smallest discomfort. It is the most beautiful and unselfish love to observe even as the child grows and develops. Both play an important part in the relationship. Both need each other to grow and function and exchange love and understanding and respect.

Today, there are numerous magazine and newspaper articles dealing with the difficulties people experience in getting along with their children, mates and other people in general. We are



learning painfully that until we deal with our problems openly, we cannot and will not find the solutions. We must not be afraid to open up and release our fears and repressions so that we can identify with them the reasons for out outward behavior. It is to our advantage to obtain this awareness and self-understanding. We can blame the world, our environment, our parents, childhood, etc. and continue to be unhappy. Or we can realize that the world we experience is the world we are prepared to experience. We, as adults, create our own world and can change it through our understanding of ourself and others, and through the transformation of our thoughts and attitudes.

One of the tools we may employ for greater understanding and awareness is psychology and under its present name it is a very new science. Yet psychology is one of the few reliable maps we have. In its deepest sense, psychology has existed for long time under other names, the earliest of which was astrology. The word derives from two Greek words -- psyche, which means soul, and logos, which means wisdom. The study of the human soul was the province of astrology long before it became the province of anything else. The oldest and the youngest science seem to be forming a The late curious marriage. psychologist Dr. Carl Gustav Jung studied many areas of unusual phenomena and in his research he not only found that astrology worked but that it was the root-science of all psychology. He postulated that the human psyche is a self-regulating system that maintains itself in as does equalibrium body...(conscious-unconscious). Everything that is not contained in the conscious or outward expression (ego) in the life is suppressed or lays dormant in the unconscious. He also maintained

that the primary expression of the subconscious is the SYMBOL, A symbol suggests or infers an aspect of life which is inexhaustable in interpretation and eludes all of the intellect's efforts to fix or contain it. A symbol sparks a response from us at an unconscious level as it brings together associations that are not logically connected. This is why when we wake up and remember a dream, it usually does not make sense at first as there are so many unrelated aspects to the dream. If the dream was very painful we will quickly forget it. Other times we may reflect on it and slowly a meaning will become obvious. Yet if we were to tell it to someone else that person might get a completely different message due to their interpretation of its symbols, since most symbols are unique to each individual. Even a trained professional cannot be absolutely sure as to the meaning of those symbols and how they relate to an individuals own mind. I am trying to make you aware of how unique we all are.

This uniqueness is also apparant in the interpretation of an individual's astrological pattern and aspects that his natal chart offers.

Astrology is enjoying a renaissance. But its real value is not in the popular misguided conception of forcasting the future. It has a much more important role in becoming a tool of immense power in the exploration of the human psyche. The successful predictability of anything varies according to its level of complexity. A human being is the least predictable of all because of his complexity. He has reason, emotion, free will, and detachment and all play an important part in his behavioral pattern.

What the birth information can offer is perhaps a greater insight as to the hidden factors buried in the subconscious. Most are so subtle that one is not consciously aware until he

experiences a traumatic event in his life ... divorce, death, separation..and he is forced to face & deal with the reasons for compulsive behavioral patterns that are often harmful and are certainly obstacles to personal happiness. It will also symbolize what type of relationship one desires or is capable of having. If an individual experiences many problems or the same problem in relationships, changing partners is not going to affect or help the problem. The individual must be made aware of the reason he attracts this situation or response.

There are basic reasons for relationships; alleviation of loneliness, satisfaction of desire, continuity of the species, protection for the individual and for society. But like the word "love" the experience is very personal and varies with each one of us.

We must all in the end, accept the consequences of our choices and they are never as simple as they seem. The growth of a person is slow; it begins at birth and ends at death. It requires a lifetime's nurturing and cannot be hurried. Love is an experience and we must learn to respect and live up to its commitment. It is not something that can be turned on and off like a water faucet. Love is God. Love is You. Love is Life. Love is happiness.





GALLERY VIEWS

Studio 395, owned by Dick Shanley, Don Hicks, John Douksza, and Abby Rust is located next to the Mobil gas station some distance before you get to the cluster of shops in Cold Spring Harbor. I missed their opening exhibit, but like many galleries, there is still lots to see between special exhibits.

John Douksza was minding the studio when I dropped by. His specialty is making silver jewelry. A bracelet of cast element attached to forged wire with a Mother of Pearl stone is called pendant A 'Angelica". suggestions of writings and topped with a Black Jade is called, "Message of the Sentinel". A ring called "Grotto" has the effect of eroded rock and caves. Pendants with Painted Jaspers stones by Mother Nature to resemble desert scenes has detachable pins or can be worn as necklaces. There is a bracelet with forged wire base with a looping counterpoint to the main lines with a red coral stone attached. There is a pin in Oval form with an abstract form in it. "A Late Form" is a winged shaped pendant in sterling, one side is smooth, the other is feathery in texture.

The woodworks of Dick Shanley are made of walnut. Sculptured in shape and smooth to the touch as well as the eyes. The dove-tailed joints fitting so smoothly as to appear as decoration to the design as well as the mark of fine craftsmanship. I viewed the collectors chest with eleven drawers.



BIRTH OF TIME 1 by Nancy Baldwin

The work of guest artist, Nancy Baldwin's porcelain sculpture "Birth of Time 1" is a capsule shaped sculpture with a layer of material or substance suggesting water, upon a watchband is layed and a baby's hand holds the face of the watch up. (See Photo). Another porcelain has a babys leg and foot with three corn stripped of outter husks located where the leg joins the body and a tiny seated male figure is called "The Farmer Who Lives At the Foot of the Mountain". Both pieces suggest sexual as well as Biblical thoughts.

The Serigraphs of Joan Rogers are abstract shapes broken into two colors, dark blue and yellow ochre with vertical lines over the total.

The Collagraph titled "English Landscape" by Sylvia Wolff has more color to it and resembles a section cut out of an ant farm colony.

REPORT TO ANIMAL DUMPERS

The three kittens dumped on 25A Main Street Huntington, two dead and one lived. Black twelve week old dumped on a side road off Oakwood Road is still struggling to live, suffering from acute malnutrition, upper respiratory infection. Cost to date-so. Of for veterinary fee and medication.

The large orange cat dumped at Huntington RR Station, after 2 weeks of leaving food every day finally came out of hiding and could be picked up, he was suffering from cuts and bites and was put into the hospital, had both front feet lanced and absesses drained, scraped and sewn up. He is doing well and has been adopted. Cost \$85.00

Lovely 11 month old female, pregnant and delivered kittens the same night she was found. Suffering from mammary infection do to lack of proper food during gestation period, kittens had to be fed by hand with suppli-

mentary diet. Cost \$67.00.

The black cat about 1 year old dumped (had been declawed) survived in back yards and garbage cans. She turned into an unadoptable biter. She is so freaked out from her experience of trying to survive with no defense due to being declawed, she will have to be put down. Everyone who has seen her will not adopt her as she is terrified and tries to bite.

Also the little 8 week old tiger found rummaging in the garbage cans behind a restaurant just off main street has gone blind from malnutrition. To be put to sleep as no one will adopt a blind

kitten.

The 7 year old cat left in a box in front of a store on Main St. Attention dumper: Your note said she was spayed and declawed, But you failed to tell her name, what she had been eating and/or if she has any medical problems. She has dehydrated and lost weight as she will not eat the various foods offered to her. She is in the hospital now. Perhaps we have not found the food she is used to or she is just broken hearted and misses her family.

I do not know what dumpers of animals think happens to them, but I have news for you, its not pretty. Starvation, malnutrition, bitten up and beaten up by other animals, abused and stoned by people and chased away, is the most terrifying experience for any animal. With all the tree sprayingmany little animals hidden and searching food at night time have been contaminated by chemicals and suffer the most

agonizing deaths by poison.

Animal dumpers must think that there is a fairyland out there and dream that the world is wonderful for all dumped animals, not so. The majority of abandoned animals are killed, or turned into shelters that must destroy them. Those who do not get adopted must make room for the thousand more turned in. There is just not enough room at a shelter and not enough money to cope with the animal over population problem.

There are alternatives to dumping, there are alternatives to over population. First: If you have not neutered your animals that is the first thing to do. Do not deceive yourself that you are different and can always get your litter adopted. It is much better to spay and neuter then to find out later you are wrong and become desperate and end up dumping. If you do not neuter your animal you are only adding more problems to the already over burdened

surplus animal world.

It is better to put to sleep humanly unwanted litters than to dump. To some this may sound cruel, but from personal experience seeing the mangled, damaged, starved and suffering animals, this is a far crueler way to die then just going to sleep under the guidance of a veterinarian. The local animal shelter will receive your litter and keep them for adoption and destroy only when over populated or sickness occurs. But again they can only take in what they have room for.

Second: If you have permitted your animal to become pregnant there is no harm to the animal to abort and and spay immediately as soon as you know of your animals condition. Pregnancies may also be safely terminated until

term

Third: Be a responsible pet owner, become informed regarding the truth about over population, and if you have added to this over population be responsible enough to solve the problem yourself. Spend your own time and money. Do not look to the already burdened shelters to solve your problem for you. REMEMBER THERE ARE MORE ANIMALS THAN THERE ARE HOMES FOR THEM, DO NOT CONTRIBUTE TO THE ANIMAL POPULATION EXPLOSION, PLEASE SPAY OR NEUTER YOUR PET.

Reporting progress on a Town Wide Bike Safety Program initiated in the Spring by Sammis Real Estate and Insurance organization, Quentin Sammis said that he was pleased with the activities that have taken place and expressed hope that various Townships, schools and community would continue to focus efforts on bike safety education and training.

To date a number of school groups have held "Bike Rodeos" in Huntington, and inquiries received from YDA, scouting, schools and other groups indicate more Rodeos by year's

The neighbors received a copy of the Traveler's Insurance Co. Bike Safety program Kit which among other interesting items included the following description of some typical bicycle accidents.

Karen applied her hand brakes and lost control of her bicycle. She went down an embankment into a creek and

fractured her shoulder.

As Jimmy was riding his bicycle downhill, the front wheel of his bicycle suddenly became loose and twisted. Jimmy lost control and crashed, fracturing his knee.

Bob was riding a bike without a chain guard when his foot caught between pedal and chain, he fell, suffering a concussion and skull fracture.

Ten-year old Pat was riding her bicycle uphill when one foot slipped off the pedal. She fell on the hard pavement and fractured her arm.

Michele was riding her bike alongside a friend's. As her friend moved his bike to the right, the two front wheels locked together, causing Michele to fall. She suffered a concussion and fractured her wrist.

Tony was riding John home from school on the handlebars of his bicycle. Because John blocked Tony's view. Tony ran the bike into a parked car. Both boys sustained severe bruises.

These case histories illustrate the major accident patterns associated with bicycles.

They are:

1. LOSS OF CONTROL - This occurs because of faulty brakes; riding too large a bike; riding double on banana seats, rear fenders, handlebars or the horizontal top tube on a man's bike; stunting; and striking a rut,, bump or

2. MECHANICAL AND STRUCTURAL PROBLEMS - These include brake failure; wobbling or disengagement of the wheel or steering mechanism; difficulty in shifting gears; chain slippage; pedals falling off; and spoke breakage.

3. ENTANGLEMENT of a person's feet, hands, or clothing in the bicycle. 4. FOOT SLIPPAGE FROM PEDAL.

5. COLLISION with a car or another

bicycle.

NUMBER OF BICYCLE 6. A NUMBER OF BICYCLE ACCIDENTS INVESTIGATED BY CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY COMMISSION INVOLVED PEOPLE RIDING DOUBLE, SO AVOID CARRYING PASSENGERS.

REFLECTIONS

by David K. Benson

I sat in a darkened movie theater some nights ago and watched images of light spawned by another man's mind flicker through the dust filled air to fall on the passive white screen looming before me. Sound waves carefully synchronizedwith the moving light reverberated through the vast people filled cavern and vibrated themselves into the recesses of my brain. The silent observer which seems to always reside in a littler corner of my head had to marvel at the ability of this light and sound combination, created in another time and space and stored on strips of plastic, to evoke such a strong response from my emotions. Laughter and tears seem to come much more easily to many of us sitting close in a crowd than when living in "real life". My silent observer kept reminding me that this was an artful reproduction of life, a drama carefully concocted by a creative team of writers, technicians and actors. A creation designed to do exactly what it was doing - touching my emotions. The analytical part of my mind then led me to an even more powerful understanding of what is happening to us in our technology filled world. As a matter of fact I sat there in the theater town between the drama on the screen and the goose bumps and tingling sensation that always seem to accompany a new level of understanding of life. That understanding is simply this: technology separates us from life.

Lets look at some examples. Sitting near me, watching the movie discussed above, was a casual acquaintance who occasionally leaned over to share his enjoyment of the movie with me. I found this real life person an intrusion on my communion with the images of light and sound surrounding us. Now, some will argue that the intrusion was real and improper, but looking back on it, I'm not sure. Here was a flesh and blood person reaching out to me and I preferred to lose myself in the images floating on the screen. I think many of us often bury ourselves in technological creations as a way of retreating from life. Look at the family that watches TV together. The interaction is with the glass and transitors and play acted eminating from situations ubiquitous idiot box and not with the real live people surrounding you. The TV is on while I'm writing this and I'm having trouble concentrating on the page when the Jeffersons are cavorting through their imaginery lives and the laugh track keeps punctuating their lines.

To pursue my original stated themethere is a dimension in live entertainment that can never be


duplicated over the air waves or through a projector: the interaction between performer and audience as anyone who has ever attended a Harry Chapin concert can tell you.

A technological creation closely related to the TV which has quickly woven itself into the mainstream of American living is the electronic game.

From hand held, to coin operated, to TV attachment they have invaded with mind sapping insidiousness tar exceeding the science fiction tales of alien invaders (Maybe they are alien invaders?) Yours truly is not immune to this onslaught. Several years ago a broken back forced me to spend several months in bed and one night a friend brought his Atari over to cheer me up. I was so entranced that I finagled one for myself the very next day. I spent many hours practicing until I could beat the thing. Looking back on the experience it is annoying to me that I wasted so many hours communing with the TV set just as I now see the kids lined up in front of the coin operated monsters that are popping up in stores and restaurants all over town. (The aliens are growing now we have to feed them too!) The principle here is the same - a retreat from life. The game is predictable. After you've played it a few times you know what is going to happen. It is also a way for the player to make him or herself feel good. Get a better score and you can use the achievement to temporarily wipe away thoughts of inadequacy, failure or lack of love. The problem is that the good feeling doesn't last very long and soon you need a still higher score to feel good.

Let's look at another area where technology separates us from life - the automobile. (I'm attacking a lot of sacred cows here aren't 1?) How does your car separate you from life? Its fairly obvious when you step back and look at this process of transportation. You close yourself into a box of glass and metal, turn on the radio and control thousands of powerful explosions a minute just by pressing on the accelerator. Is anyone really aware of what is happening around him while he is driving? I'm talking about the pistons screeching up and down in the engine, the molecules of oil and metal sliding against one another, the forces absorbed by the suspension system, the number of revolutions each minute each wheel bearing must make, the tremendous friction generated between the road and the tires and the huge amount of air displaced when traveling down the highway at 55 mph. In short, the automobile is an incredible piece of machinery which most of us take for granted - at least until it malfunctions. And we have demanded that it's designers hide all these processes from us. We want to travel down the road at 55 or 75 mph feeling like we were sitting in our living room. And in large meaure

NO FAULT- AN EXPLANATION

The premise on which No-Fault auto insurance is based is to tend to the needs of the person who is hurt, no matter who caused the accident. No Fault insurance practically eliminates red tape and those delays which occur under a liability system for many bodily injury claims settlements. It can reduce administrative and other costs. associated with the lawsuit system, enabling insurance companies to pass these initial cost savings on to their policyholders. Because No-Fault is being implemented on a state-by-state basis, through state legislatures, each law is different. Benefit limits and exclusions may vary, but the premise of speedy settlement for all individuals involved in an accident -regard for fault -- remains the same.

Each accident victim is promptly reimbursed by his insurance company for economic loss -- up to the stated limits of the policy, of course -- without regard to who is at fault. Money to pay hospital and medical bills is provided, lost wages are reimbursed, and survivors' benefits and funeral expenses are paid promptly. Insurance originated as a collective kind of protection. Everyone pays into a fund from which the few who suffer losses are reimbursed. Under the No-Fault system, those who suffer losses in an automobile accident are reimbursed without delay. Not months later; not after savings have been depleted. Not after a person has been forced by necessity to settle for less than actual losses. Protection under No-Fault is comparable to that provided by a combined Life insurance and Accident and Health insurance program. The direct-payment plan removes reward and punishment as considerations. Its purpose is caring for the accident

victim, not fixing the blame.

New York State No-Fault law provides a minimum of \$50,000. medical reimbursement to each person in your automobile; included in that amount is \$1000. a month wage reimbursement, not to exceed 3 yrs., and \$25, per day additional services (should you need help at home etc.) Total benefit not to exceed \$50,000 per person. We recommend that you pay an additional \$2.00 to cover guest passengers who may travel with you out-of-state. We also recommend that for a few dollars more, usually \$4.00 to \$6.00 to increase your No-Fault per person coverage to \$75,000, \$100,000 & \$150,000, which will increase wage reimbursement accordingly to \$1500., \$2000. or \$3000. per month.







HEALTH

Weight, health and compulsive eating are completely interelated. We're programmed early in life to experience these problems when we fail to learn how to eat and live in accordance with the laws of nature and our biological requirements. By the time we're forty, we should have eaten some 40,000 meals most of which are wrong for us. Even the best machine in the world breaks down under the weight of such poor maintenance.

The body's struggle to accommodate food not natural to it's adaptation drains nervous energy (enervation) which leads to poor elimination. The toxic wastes that subsequently build up in the system and in the bloodstream (toxemia), are the underlying cause of almost every disorder, disease and abnormality known to man.

Three things result from enervation and toxicity. Deterioration accelerates wherever toxic wastes lodge. Efficiency and functioning power is reduced. The basis for abnormal weight and disease is established. As poor nutrition and enervating living habits continue, vitality is drained and energy dwindles. Toxic wastes, malnutrition and low energy triggers the need for constant pick-ups. These generally take the form of sweets, refined starches, coffee, tea and tobacco. These excite an overinsulin response (from already tired glands). This leads to unstable blood sugar levels that when too low is known as hypoglycemia and when too high as diabetes. Unreliable sources of energy motivates compulsive snacking and overeating that continue to excite glandular action unnaturally calling for a bigger and more frequent "Fix" in order to wring another round of energy from tired glands. This is how we get on the vicious cycle with it's grave of overweight, implications degeneration and disease.

As self-destructive practices continue mounting, toxic wastes get completely out of hand overwhelming the body's "Lines of Defense" (liver, kidneys, endocrine glands, etc.) The body tries to eliminate this tide of life-threatening poisons (auto-intoxication) by pressing other organs not designed for

elimination into service. Organs pressed into substitute service (vicarious elimination) include the skin, mucous membrane (lining of most organs), and all orifices including the nose, throat, ears, mouth and womb.

Skin eruptions (pimples, acne, boils, blackheads, etc.) are merely end-points or exit-points for wastes unable to escape through normal channels (about 90% of Americans are constipated). Respiratory problems (allergy, postnasal drip, nasal catarrh, sore throat, sinusitis, tonsilitis, etc.) are caused by stored wastes and the attempted exiting of wastes through outlets not designed for this purpose. Menstrual problems occur from much the same cause. Breast tumors are often lipoproten waste end-points. Colds and flu are cleansing methods on the part of the body to bring toxic wastes down to manageable levels. The "itises" (inflammation) develop when acids and other irritating substances of wastes, condiments, etc. come in contact with the delicate membranes that line all organs. Deeper tissue is also affected and blood is rushed to the area in order to help avert cell destruction.

Continued indulgence in cause leads to two things. The "Lines of defense" (liver, kidneys, glands, etc.) become exhausted so that chronic conditions What is degenerative. become commonly viewed as "disease" is nothing more than a heroic effort on the part of the body to get rid of lifethreatening wastes and to heal itself (cleansing and healing means) To treat "disease" as an enemy and try to supress it with medication, serums, antibiotics, etc. instead of fasting and resting the body and letting it run its own course is suicidal.

We've seen how abnormal weight, ill-health and disease spring from the same cause rooted in wrong eating and living practices. We've seen how these problems are all part of the same complex of disorders. What then can be done to help restore normality? When the causes are eliminated and the right conditions conducive to recovery are instituted, the body is given the opportunity commence the restorative process.

It has a big job to do. It has to cleanse, heal, repair, regenerate and normalize itself, but I can assure you, given the right regime, the body will start taking these constructive measure from the first day. This is because nature seeks to perfect all her creatures. Even when they've strayed from the path of conformance with her laws. As long as the point of no return has not been

reached, a secrit chance awaits.

No artificiz or superficial program will do. It takes a very special program of eating and living, that's why deprivaton methods such as calorie and carbohydrate counting appetite suppressants, distorted and unbalanced diets are doomed to fail (although they often provide false hope through surface changes) when it comes to permanently correcting the conditions that brought on abnormal weight problems. Similarly in problems. Drugs, medication, pills, stimulants, tonics, etc. can only palliate and suppress. They can never contribute to the body's desire and ability to restore normality.

The correct program of eating and living attends to all of these problems at one time. Given the right, natural program, remarkable changes can be

looked forward to. Weight should normalize with remarkable speed (the body abhors excess weight). Even long standing health problems can remit. Literally a new person can emerge. It is worth everyone's efforts, overweight or not to seek out and follow such a program. It can provide a new lease on life.

RECIPES

Although the hot weather is still with us, there are times when we want to serve a special dinner. Bourguignon is what I surprised David with on his recent birthday. Everyone loved it - so much so that there were no "leftovers" to refrigerate!

Beef Bourguignon

4 slices bacon

1 t. salt

1/2 t. dry mustard

1 C. red wine

1 C. consumme 1 bunch carrots

4 cloves

1/4 t. salt

3 T flour

1/8 t. pepper

3 lbs. round steak cubed in 1 inch squares

12 small white onions

2 bay leaves

1/4 f. thyme

1/8 t. pepper 1/2 lb. mushrooms

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Fry bacon over medium heat in large frying pan for 5 minutes. While bacon is frying combine 3 T flour, 1 t. salt, 1/8 t. pepper and 1/2 t. dry mustard in a sturdy paper bag. Dredge 3 lbs. cubed round steak in this mixture and set aside. Saving the fat in the pan, remove the bacon and dry on absorbent paper. Brown beef in bacon fat for about 10 minutes, turning occasionally. Mix 1 C. red wine and 1 C. consumme in medium pot. Bring to a boil and let simmer for 5 minutes. Peel 12 small white onions and set aside. Place browned beef in large casserole. Add onions and consumme - wine mixture. Cover casserole and place in oven for 1 hour and 20 minutes. Then add carrots, 2 bat leaves, 4 cloves, 1/4 t. thyme, 1/4 t. salt and 1/8 t. pepper. Cover again and cook 25 minutes. Add washed and stemmed mushrooms to casserole and recover. Turn oven heat up to 350 degrees and heat casserole about 10 minutes. Add bacon bits and heat another 5 minutes.



SAVINGS ACCOUNT INTEREST by Carol Glazer

Higher interest rates and the growth of money markets have altered the way most of us save. A few years ago, we kept our money in savings accounts if it wasn't invested in some way. Today, consumers can chose from a number of highyielding short term investments. And, with interest rates at or near record levels, these savings programs can offer some refuge from current inilation!

There are many alternatives available. The following is a listing of some of the more popular savings vehicles. Which one is right for you can be determined by you and your Account Executive. The rates listed were those in effect the week of 8/8/81.

6-MONTH MONEY MARKET CERTIFICATES [CD's]

These are available at any bank or savings institution. The rate changes for new certificates each week on Tuesday since it is tied to 6-month Treasury bills, which are auctioned every Monday:

The minimum deposit is \$10,000. Penalty for early withdrawal of principal is 3 months' interest on the amount withdrawn. Also, some institutions will not allow withdrawal without their permission so make sure to ask before you commit your funds.


Some banks allow depositors to take out a certificate with as little as \$3000, the bank loans the balance (to 10,000) at a low interest rate. The net return is not as high as it would be if the investor had the full \$10,000 but it is above the rate on simple savings accounts. (Current rate is 15.82%)

UNIT INVESTMENT TRUSTS For a minimum investment of about \$1000, you buy a 6 month unit of a pool ef hundreds of millions of dollars in Bank CD's. They have set interest rates like CD's and generally pay a higher return. You can sell your unit trust back to the investment firm at any time, earning all of the interest to that point. If interest rates have fallen since you bought your unit, you may sell at a profit, but if rates have risen, you may sell at a loss. The idea is to hold it for 6 months. There is a one-time charge of about \$7.50 per \$1000 unit and the units are issued every few days and the rates at issue depend on interest rates. To buy a unit trust, call your Account Executive and ask for a rate indication. Since they are only sold by investment firms. (Current rate is 17.2%)

Available in 3 and 6 month terms, and can be purchased for a mimimum of 10,000 each. They are auctioned every Monday through the Federal Reserve

You can either bid for them (offer the government a rate) or buy them at whatever the average discount rate turns out to be. For most of us, the latter is the smarter way to buy, since you are guaranteed to get a T bill only if you take the average.

Local banks and investment firms will buy a T bill for you for a small fee or you can buy them directly, with no fee, from the Federal Reserve.

T bills are bought at a discount - that is, when you buy one, you submit payment of \$10,000 and a few days later the government pays your interest in advance in the form of a refund. The discount rate determines the size of the refund and thus the yield. At the end of the 3 or 6 months, you get your full \$10,000 in principal back. T bills, can be sold before maturity while bank CD's are not negotiable. And, with a T-bill, you get your return up-front, allowing you to reinvest it immediately. Interest is exempt from State tax but not Federal, (Current rate is 15.571%.

MONEY MARKETS FUNDS

We discussed money markets before but let's review. These are simply managed pools of investor's dollars invested in large-denomination CD's, corporate commercial paper, treasury securities, etc. Most funds require a minimum initial deposit with stated increments after that. There is usually no minimum balance required to keep the account open. You may mail your deposit directly to the bank administering the fund or go through your Account Executive. The fund's yield fluctuates daily depending on prevailing interest rates. Most money market funds carry no service fees and you can take your money out at any time and receive all of the interest earned to that last day. In effect, you have a high yielding savings account. (Current rate is 17-17.8%)

REPURCHASE AGREEMENTS

These are technically loans by individuals to banks. The term can be anywhere from a few days to about 3 'months, and the rates are set. Investors may often withdraw funds at any time after the first few days of the term without penalty and take the interest he has earned to that point. Some banks charge a fee if the "repo" is cashed in early. (Current rate is 16.5%)

COMMERCIAL PAPERS

Commercial paper consists of unsecured short-term promissory notes issued in bearer form by large, wellknown businesses. Maturities range from a few days to 270 days. Commercial paper is used by businessses chiefly for financing accounts receivable and seasonal or otherwise unusually large inventories. You may usually obtain the current rates from investment firms and banks. Some companies maintain a minimum



NUTRITION

Feeling a little like Samson, I stood on the plush purple carpet while a gorgeous redhead came up behind me, brushed her hand gently up my neck and ... clipped some hair which she neatly stuffed into an envelope tagged with my name. What was I doing, you want to know? I guess if you have a normal amount of curiosity the question is perfectly understandable. Well, I was at Pre'formance Cosmetics in Huntington Village and they do a lot more than just provide cosmetics. One of their services is nutritional counseling and my hair sample was taken to be sent to a lab for analysis of its mineral

and toxic metal content.

According to Georgeann Dau, the edhead mentioned above, vitamin levels are influenced by the amount of the various minerals found in your body.

Hair analysis will give you a reading on these minerals and toxic metal levels as well. Only then can the proper amounts of vitamins be prescribed to bring your body chemistry into balance. Minerals and vitamins should not be added to your diet in a "shot gun" approach. Too much may be just as dangerous as too little

as dangerous as too little.

According to Dr. Michael Lesser in his book "Nutrition and Vitamin Therapy" (Bantam Paper Back - 1980) hair samples should be collected close to the scalp.
